# DOWNTOWN OUTREACH TEAM PILOT



### 1. WHAT IS STREET OUTREACH AND BDOT?

Street outreach teams are a way to engage and support street-involved people without police enforcement.

Street outreach teams often focus on providing client-driven and client-focused services.

Brantford Downtown Outreach Team (BDOT) Pilot operated from July 2019 to June 2020. They reached out to people experiencing:

- housing instability
- mental health challenges
- substance use issues

 those in need of support navigating resources and sources

### The BDOT supported people in downtown Brantford by:

- Providing resources and supplies like water, snacks, and hygiene products
- Offering warm introductions between service users and service providers
- Helping coordinate appointments and transportation
- Responding to community referrals and concerns
- Advocating for a more accessible and welcoming service system

### 2. WHO COMPRISED THE BDOT TEAM?

- Coordinator & Crisis Worker
- Concurrent Disorders Clinician
- Peer Support Worker
- Nurse Practitioner



### 3. HOW DID BDOT WORK?

- Building rapport with service users to understand how to connect needs with services
- Leveraging existing relationships with different services in Downtown Brantford to build a stronger service system
- Making decisions based on data and experience
- Responding flexibly to service users' needs and emerging community issues to be at the right place and at the right time
- Providing frontline assistance to service users during the initial months of COVID-19 pandemic



### 4. WHERE IS BDOT NOW?

BDOT is thriving again and providing outreach beyond the borders of Downtown Brantford. The growing need for services and the successful Pilot project helped leverage over \$1 million dollars from Health Canada's Substance Use and Abuse Program (SUAP) from

April 2021 to March 2023. The Team expanded and continues providing high quality, best practice-informed services to those who want help with substance use issues, homelessness, and mental health challenges.

#### SOME IMPORTANT IMPACTS OF COVID-19:

The initial BDOT pilot was disrupted by the global COVID-19 pandemic. Despite experiencing a dramatic shift in the way the team delivered its services, the BDOT continued to support those in need. During the first wave of the virus, the BDOT saw a 25% increase in the number of high-risk interactions, and 39% growth in physical health issues.
